Criteria for 2025 MN Energy Action Plan Strategies

- Strategy or technology's potential impact toward current MN energy, climate or other air quality and environmental justice goals
- 2. The potential for the 2025 Energy Action Plan Project to move the needle on a particular strategy in the context of related projects in MN.
- 3. Likely benefits relative to costs (based on your knowledge of existing information)
- 4. Commitment by stakeholders or other champions to advancing the strategy and ability to leverage additional resources
- 5. Has potential to provide benefits across sectors

Questions to Consider for 2025 MN Energy Action Plan Strategies

- 1. Which organization(s) might own/lead the strategy?
 Who are the action takers?
- 2. Are the actions outlined the right ones? What additional actions are required to capture the opportunity?
- 3. Are the success factors right?
- 4. What are the top (2-3) metrics? Any sources of data that you have or know of?
- 5. Are the cross-sector opportunities correctly identified?
